Workshops

“Arabs and Muslims: What You Know, What You Think You Know, What You Want to Know.”

Video and interactive presentation on Arab culture and Islam presented by two Arab-American youth who call Brooklyn home. For ages 12 up. Presented by **Fatima Benhalima** and **Phatin Jarara** from the **Mosaic Youth Project, CAMBA** (with the support of Debbie Almontaser, Marc Fallon, and Jill Strauss). CAMBA, the Church Avenue Merchants Block Association, one of Brooklyn’s largest community-based social service organizations, provides a continuum of employment, education, health, housing, legal, social, business development and youth services to approximately 24,000 people each year.

Being Peace: Be the Change You Want To See in the World

We will discuss simple techniques to bring mindfulness into every moment of our lives; how to foster peace within ourselves and others; and how to bring mindfulness into our peace and justice activism. We will end with a walking meditation in the garden. For all ages; children often enjoy these exercises. Presented by **Patrecia Lenore** from **The Mindfulness Center** and **Stuart Garber** from **Full Spectrum Touch Massage and Body Therapy**.

Brothers and Others

Video documentary on the impact of 9/11 on Muslims and Arabs in America. The film follows a number of immigrants and Americans as they struggle in the heightened climate of hate, FBI and INS investigations, and economic hardships. Featuring interviews with Noam Chomsky and James Zogby. Presented by **Terry Hasan** from **Not In Our Name’s (NION) Resistance Cinema**. NION is a national coalition of groups across the US that have made a pledge against the war on terrorism, which they call a “war without limits.” Resistance Cinema, a project of the New York affiliate, is a documentary film series that uses film as a “weapon of mass instruction” to raise resistance against a War on the World, Detentions and Round-ups and Police State Restrictions.

Civilian Casualties: Fragments from the War on Terror

A video and discussion about a January 2002 trip to Afghanistan by representatives of **September Eleventh Families for**

Peaceful Tomorrows. Presented by **Rita Lasar**, who is featured in the film. Peaceful Tomorrows is an advocacy organization founded by family members of September 11th victims who have united to turn their grief into action for peace. Their mission is to seek effective, nonviolent solutions to terrorism, and to acknowledge their common experience with all people similarly affected by violence throughout the world.

A Conversation About Conflict

This open dialogue on how to respond to conflicts—the small, everyday ones as well as the larger ones that affect us all—is an opportunity to explore the way we deal with conflict, as individuals, as a community and as a society. The Conversation format was created by **Search for Common Ground**, an international non-profit organization whose mission is to transform the way the world deals with conflict: away from adversarial approaches, toward cooperative solutions. The Conversation is presented by the American Friends Service Committee in partnership with SFCG; The AFSC carries out service, development, social justice, and peace programs throughout the world. Facilitators are **Laurence Berg**, Director of the Conflict Resolution Program of the AFSC’s New York metropolitan regional office, and **Kathy Vaughan**, Assistant Director of Mediation, New York Center of Interpersonal Development.

The Cost of Bush: A Trivia Teach-In

A game for youth that demonstrates the effects of changes in domestic spending caused by spending on the war, tax cuts, and Bush’s general philosophy. Presented by **Vandra Thorburn** and **Bonnie Nuzum** of **Wise-Up America** (formerly Concerned Women of Brooklyn). Wise-Up (Women Influencing Social and Economic Policy) is a grass-roots political organization devoted to raising public awareness about destructive changes in rights, entitlements, and civil and individual liberties.

Dances for Peace

Dance workshop in which kids will make up dances for peace. Presented by **Jesse Phillips-Fein**, **Rachel Lane**, and **Kate Lieberman** from **Box By Three**, a Brooklyn-based contemporary dance company dedicated to collaborative choreography.

Difference is Beautiful

Mural painting project for all ages. After exploring the things that we have in common and the things that make us unique, participants will visually portray important aspects of themselves and their identities in mosaic tiles. The resulting mural will reflect the beauty of the NYC mosaic. Come prepared to paint and draw and have lots of fun. Presented by **Fairuz Begum** and **Tania**

Chowdhury and the Mosaic Youth Project, CAMBA (with the support of Debbie Almontaser, Marc Fallon, and Jill Strauss). **CAMBA**, the Church Avenue Merchants Block Association, one of Brooklyn's largest community-based social service organizations, provides a continuum of employment, education, health, housing, legal, social, business development and youth services to approximately 24,000 people each year.

Doo Wop Moderno

Rubi Theater Company's Doo Wop Moderno music group sings in Spanish and English about issues that affect all of us. They have performed and recorded with Dan Zanes and "poet of the political imagination" Martin Espada. During the Gulf War, Artistic Director Jose Joaquin Garcia did guerilla theater in the schools to get the word out on the draft situation for black and Latino high school students.

Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr.: His Life, His Work, His Mission, and the Civil Rights Movement

A presentation for junior and senior high school students and young adults about Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr.: his life, work, and mission, and the Civil Rights Movement. Presented by the **Martin Luther King, Jr. Center: New York Support Group**.

Drama Games for Peace

Did you ever take drama or improvisation in school or watch "Whose Line Is That"? We are going to play some really fun drama games and do improv. We're probably going to laugh a lot, but we'll also brainstorm and improvise peaceful solutions to situations of conflict. For ages 10 and up. Presented by **Tom Caplan** of **Creative Response To Conflict**, an organization that has been training teachers, parents and community groups in cooperative peacemaking for nearly 30 years. First sponsored by the New York Friends Meeting in the early 70's, it has grown into an international program that provides specially designed activities in which participants experience ways to examine conflict and develop solutions. Our activities give people the skills to improve self-concept, communicate more effectively, and build a cooperative environment in which conflict resolution can be practiced and discussed creatively.

Drama Through Poetry

Ron Burd, whose six books of poetry include a wide variety of poems about family, children, peace and other topics, will read his work and invite participants to read their own poetry.

Ending the Korean War

Video and discussion: Is the Korean War going to re-start? Will North Korea be the next target of Bush's endless war on terror? Didn't the Korean War end in 1953? If not, how do we end our country's longest unauthorized war, still ongoing? Presented by **John Kim** of **Veterans for Peace—NYC chapter**.

Family Yoga

Yoga class for adults and children. Presented by **Philippa Woolley** from **The Stables**, a studio in Williamsburg, Brooklyn, that offers classes for adults and children.

Give Us the Names

This 28-minute video documents the demonstrations at the Metropolitan Detention Center in Sunset Park from January to October 2002. These protests, which included over 100 labor, peace, and social justice organizations, broke the silence of the government's secret detentions of hundreds of Arab and Muslim immigrants after Sept. 11, 2001. Presented by **Tracy Gross**, filmmaker.

Hopes and Concerns for Planet Earth's Communities

Playback Theater performance, using a form of improvisational theater in which the audience interacts with the performers by telling stories from real-life experience. The performers then literally "play back" what they heard, recreating the events on stage.

"How to Work for Peace in Congress"

Congressman Major Owens will give an update on the current status of peace issues in Congress and talk about how to be an effective advocate for peace. Elected to the US House of Representatives in 1982 from New York's 11th Congressional District, Representative Owens is a member of the vital Education and the Workforce Committee, which guides all federal involvement in education, job training, labor law, employee safety and pensions, programs for the aging and people with disabilities, and equal employment opportunities. He led the fight for minimum wage increases, blocked the attempt to eliminate cash payments for overtime, confronted the steam-rolling attempt to repeal Davis-Bacon, defeated the conspiracy to dismantle the Occupational Safety and Health Administration, and spearheaded the fight against legislation designed to gag labor unions. As Chairman of the Subcommittee on Select Education and Civil Rights for six years, Representative Owens' record for passing legislation was second in New York only to that of Adam Clayton Powell. As Chairman of the Congressional Black Caucus Task Force on Haiti, he led the successful three-year fight which restored Haiti's democrati-

cally elected President. Representative Owens has had previous high achievement careers as a public library Community Coordinator, a Community Action Executive, a New York City Commissioner, a Columbia University Professor, and a New York State Senator.

How We Treat Each Other Post 9/11

A discussion group for kids on how we treat each other post-9/11: Arab Muslim community concerns about stereotypes and fears; fears about terrorism; and teaching children conflict resolution. Presented by **Amy Haus**, **Evelyn Rowe-Cosentino**, and **Craig Haen** from the **American Group Psychotherapy Association**, a professional organization of highly trained mental health professionals. We have been funded by the Robin Hood Foundation to provide expert group interventions for people who might be deterred from seeking help because of financial considerations, unawareness of the potential benefits of group participation, or fear of stigma.

Iraq: Where Are We Now?

It's a challenge to figure out what sort of response to the war and occupation in Iraq makes sense. This informal workshop for teenagers and adults is designed to provide some analysis of the situation in Iraq, at the UN, and here at home and to enable participants to share questions and concerns. Presented by **Carolyn Eisenberg**, Co-Chair of Brooklyn Parents for Peace, Professor of Foreign Policy at Hofstra University and Visiting Professor at Dartmouth College.

Karate Demonstration and Workshop

Teen and adult women, teachers and peer educators from PACT (Power, Action, and Change for Teen women), a program of the **Center for Anti-Violence Education**, will talk about PACT, display an anti-war mural created by PACT's teen women, and present a brief martial arts demo. CAVE is a community-based nonprofit organization that works as a catalyst for change in the lives of women, teen women, children, and other communities especially affected by violence.

Liberia West Africa— Yesterday, Today, and Tomorrow

A short film and discussion of the situation in Liberia today, its causes and its possible solutions, for people 15 and up. We will solicit questions and comments from the audience and share as much information as time allows. Presented by **Bisi Iderabdullah**, **Executive Director of IMANI HOUSE**, and **Haley Swartz of AmeriCorps*VISTA**. IMANI HOUSE is a nonprofit organization whose mission is to assist low-income

youth, immigrants and families in Brooklyn and Liberia West Africa to become self sufficient in order to improve the quality of life of their families, their communities and themselves. AmeriCorps*VISTA is a national service program that for 35 years has been helping bring communities and individuals out of poverty.

Military Myths

This 30-minute video about recruiting and military life was made for and by recruitment-age youth. A discussion will follow. Presented by the **War Resisters' League**, which affirms that all war is a crime against humanity. The WRL therefore is determined not to support any kind of war, international or civil, and to strive nonviolently for the removal of all causes of war.

“Palestine Is Still the Issue”

Laura Cahn spent two months in the occupied Palestinian territories in summer 2003. She and other members of **Jews Against The Occupation-NYC** will discuss the situation in Israel and the occupied Palestinian territories, based on their first-hand experiences. A short film about the construction and effects of the Apartheid Wall that Israel is building in the West Bank will be shown. Jews Against the Occupation is an organization of progressive, secular and religious Jews of all ages throughout the New York City area that advocates peace through justice for Palestine and Israel.

PEACE Art Expression Session

A discussion on “What is art?” and “What does PEACE mean to you?” leads into two art projects: “Create Your Own PEACE” (wearable art) and “Lei Making” (Hawaiian flower garland). We present universal themes through different art forms, encouraging participants individual expression while emphasizing our inherent interconnectivity and oneness. For ages 2-13 (4 and under with parental supervision please). Presented by **Dewi Lim** and **Kaina Quenga** of **Art Unites Us**, a group from Hawaii.

Peace Poetry Workshop

For children 8 to 14. Participants will be guided through a playful method of producing images, based on which they write their own poems about war or peace. They then read their poems aloud for others to respond. We use the technique of the New York Writers Coalition, which involves only positive reinforcement (no negative criticism). Participants

who choose to can read their work at the Shout Out at the end of the day. Presented by *Judith David*, freelance writer and former librarian, member of the New York Writers Coalition.

Peacemaking Delegation to Iraq

This video summarizes a one-week delegation to Iraq just before the war. Footage includes visits to hospitals, an Iraqi family at home, and a peace march in downtown Baghdad. Presented by *Rev. Tom Reiber-Martinez* of All Souls Bethlehem Church, who was part of the delegation and made the video.

Political Singalong with the Raging Grannies and Their Daughters

The RGs—whose ages span from 38 to 80—sing political and satirical songs, often adapted from old familiar tunes. They perform at marches, rallies, and other events, and enjoy combining their politics with theater. Presented by the *Women's International League for Peace and Freedom*. Founded in 1915 during World War I, with Jane Addams as its first president, WILPF works to achieve through peaceful means world disarmament, full rights for women, racial and economic justice, an end to all forms of violence, and to establish those political, social, and psychological conditions which can assure peace, freedom, and justice for all. WILPF works to create an environment of political, economic, social and psychological freedom for all members of the human community, so that true peace can be enjoyed by all.

Rehumanize Quilt Project

All are invited to come draw a square and sew a patch on this quilt, as a memorial for those who have died in Iraq as a result of this war. The Park Slope-based *Rehumanize Quilt project* was conceived in spring 2003 as a collective, interactive, nation-wide response to the war. The quilt is something simple and powerful that will help people to think about the war's reality, as well as hopefully change people's hearts about the necessity of war and to prevent another one from happening.

River Mural

Mural painting project presented by the *Brooklyn Society for Ethical Culture*, a humanist religious organization dedicated to improving the ethical quality of relationships in personal lives and in the world.

Safety and Security: A Dialogue among Jews, Palestinians, and Others

Presented by the *Middle East Dialogue Project*, which brings together adult Palestinians, Jews/Israelis, and Supportive Others (Christian, Muslim, secularist, humanist, etc.) for intense dialogue and intimate conversation. The members share a commitment to "public diplomacy"—the idea that people make peace, governments make policy. Dialogue circles meet on a monthly basis with interfaith and social gatherings in between.

Sew a Patch for Peace

We will sew a quilt for peace and a FOR PEACE header. Everyone is invited to come sew a patch on the quilt for peace. Presented by *Soka Gakkai International*, an American Buddhist association that promotes world peace and individual happiness based on the teachings of the Nichiren school of Mahayana Buddhism. Presented by the Brooklyn Region of SGI.

Shout Out

A forum for youth to share their thoughts through dance, song, spoken word—or whatever. Emcee'd by *Urban Word NYC* (formerly Youth Speaks NY), which was established in partnership with Teachers & Writers Collaborative in 1999. Urban Word has provided thousands of New York City teenagers with free, safe, ongoing, and uncensored writing and performance opportunities. Urban Word believes that teenagers can *and must* speak for themselves and the key to building self-confidence, honing critical thinking skills, and developing imaginative and honest writing is to honor what they say and feel.

"Sikh Intentions"

This performance of traditional Sikh dance and panel presentation, for ages 12 to adult, shows who we are, what we believe in, and how we apply our beliefs to interact and peacefully coexist with other communities. Presented by *Prabhkaren S. Bedi, Simardev Gulati, Deedar Singh, and Joginder Singh* of the Mosaic Youth Project, CAMBA (with the support of Debbie Almontaser, Marc Fallon, and Jill Strauss). *CAMBA*, the Church Avenue Merchants Block Association, one of Brooklyn's largest community-based social service organizations, provides a continuum of employment, education, health, housing, legal, social, business development and youth services to approximately 24,000 people each year.

Spoken Word—Youth Poetry

Videos and discussion with civil rights leader David Dennis. Presented by *American Civil Rights Education Services*, which

provides civil rights education programs for students, parents, and teachers from traditionally marginalized communities. By teaching civil-rights-era history, exposing program participants to living historical figures, and facilitating youth leadership opportunities, ACRES teaches civic responsibility, promotes cross-cultural understanding, celebrates diversity, and seeks—in the words of Congressman John Lewis—“to lay down the burden of race.”

Storytelling for Peace

This dynamic storytelling performance features *Shirazad's Children: Joy Kelly, Alison Fleminger, Bobby Gonzalez, Skip LaPlante, Alan Siege, and Robin Bady*. This multi-cultural ensemble of storytellers came together in response to the events of September 11 to offer collaborative storytelling programs. Their vision is of cultural inclusion, promoting unity as well as respect for differences. Like Queen Shirazad of 1001 Arabian Nights, they believe that storytelling and stories have the power to heal, soothe, offer strength, entertain and awaken.

Suku Stars

This dance troupe of teens and adults from Zaire will perform; then, members of the company will discuss the situation in their country. The *Suku Stars* are led by *Simba Yangala*.

T-Shirts for Peace

Participants use an outline of a T-shirt on a piece of paper to draw, color, or mark up their own “shirt” into a message of peace. They will also be encouraged to use this template to make other statements that highlight their favorite food, hobby, holiday, friend, or whatever. They may work together or individually on their piece. They will be able to take their creation home with them, spreading their message around. Presented by *Loren Weybright* of *Creative Response To Conflict*, an organization that has been training teachers, parents and community groups in cooperative peacemaking for nearly 30 years. First sponsored by the New York Friends Meeting in the early 70's, it has grown into an international program.

T'ai Chi for Adults and Teens

A gentle, energizing workshop, including meditation, healing movement, and the opportunity to learn a brief, adapted form from the Yang style of T'ai Chi. People of all abilities are welcome to join and renew their spirits. Presented by *Geleni Fontaine* from *The Center for Anti-Violence Education*, a community-based nonprofit organization that works as a catalyst for change in the lives of women, teen women, children, and other communities especially affected by violence.

“Talking with Young Children about War and Peace”

This workshop will help parents of children 5 and under answer questions about war, peace, terrorism, and other difficult, emotional subjects. We will discuss: how to tailor answers to your child's age and developmental level; how to use play to help children understand difficult topics; how to limit the amount of scary or confusing information that your child is exposed to. Presented by *Meredith Gary*, Teacher-Director of the Williamsburg Neighborhood Nursery School. Please note that this workshop is for *adults only*.

Victory Over Violence

This video discusses violence and the relationship between individual acts of violence and violence at large. Ordinary youth appear, as well as peace luminaries such as Arun Gandhi and Rev. Carter of Moorhouse College. It was created by the Youth Division of *Soka Gakkai International*, an American Buddhist association that promotes world peace and individual happiness based on the teachings of the Nichiren school of Mahayana Buddhism. Presented by the Brooklyn Region of SGI.

“What Do I Say to My Child When She Asks ‘Why,’ ‘Will It Happen Again,’ and Everything in Between”

Interactive workshop for parents of school-age children. We will attempt to understand our children's concerns and develop strategies for handling them. Presented by *Helen Wintrob, Ph.D.*, a clinical psychologist who has studied and frequently spoken about the psychological implications of preparing for nuclear war.

Wind Sock for Peace

Drop in during the day to help create “Winds of Peace” wind socks, with colored streamers and drawings about peace. Presented by *Artists for Peace*, a group that came together after 9/11 to use art to explore peace and justice issues.


